Good evening, Educators, parent's fellow students and the school board of SD42, as you know I'm here today to address my concerns about the school district budget cuts. For the past three years I have been blessed to attend Thomas Haney, my first time attending a school within the school district. Coming from a Private school in Port Coquitlam it was a big change for me, but It was a good one.

I understand the position the school board is in with a projected shortfall of 5.2 million dollars this coming year, it certainly can't be easy. I'm sure you don't want to be in this position to have to decide on what to change in the schools to help save money.

As Brian Tracy said in the article about the importance of first impression "The fact is that when you first meet a person, they make a judgment about you in approximately four seconds, and their judgment is finalized largely within 30 seconds of the initial contact." The receptionist in every single school is the first person someone who enters or phones the school will have contact with or look for, this is their first impression of the school. The receptionist is the connection, no matter who the visitor is looking for the receptionists job will connect them with the person they are looking for. I'm worried that taking away this position will have a negative impact on the school, taking away the front line, the core; it can give off a very bad impression. If there is no receptionist up front and a visitor walks into the office it's not only a safety concern but the Principals and Vince principals aren't always in their offices and it piles more work on the people in the back of the office. I know as a student whenever I go into my school office our Receptionist Mrs. Murray is always there with a warm smile on her face consistently there to help, I always look forward to going

Many times I have sat in the office waiting for someone and I've seen so many teachers, parents, students come in and out looking for someone or with questions and the receptionist is that person can go to. Despite all their other important jobs as well, this position is a vital part of helping a school operate smoothly.
