The Aboriginal Education Resource Teachers provide support which is <u>additional</u> to any other programs and services to which an Aboriginal student is eligible. They are district resource teachers who provide a variety of services such as:

- Collaborate with classroom teachers to promote teaching methods consistent with Aboriginal learning needs.
- Assist with student identification/early intervention and school based assessments.
- Assist in planning, adapting and implementing individual and group activities to build Aboriginal students' self-esteem and academic success.
- Provide leadership and direction for Aboriginal Support Workers to support educational success for all Aboriginal students.

- Act as a liaison between home and school.
- Act as a cultural resource person.
- Provide information regarding opportunities for students of Aboriginal ancestry such as scholarships, employment, etc.
