The Board of Education of School District #28 Quesnel are concerned that they have been directed to develop a savings plan to fund the provincially negotiated CUPE Collective Agreement.

While the Board of Education wholeheartedly supports a raise for our support staff, it is unrealistic and short-sighted to imagine that funding these raises from within our current budget will not have a negative impact on the services provided for students. This is especially true for small districts under funding protection that do not have access to any significant alternative sources of funding (i.e. large international student programs). The Board strongly encourages government to fund 100% of the CUPE wage increase.

We have worked very hard to set a budget that is focussed on the needs of students. As much as possible of the Operating Budget is used to support students in their learning. There is no discretionary fund. The District generally has less than a 2% operating surplus annually. This surplus is necessary to address emergent needs such as staffing issues that do not fall within the LIF mandate. Approximately 90 % of the Operating Budget is allocated for wages and benefits. The remaining 10% does not allow for flexibility in spending.

The Quesnel School District is under funding protection due to declining enrolment; for the past several years there have been significant reductions in the Operating Budget. The same will be true for the 2014-2015 school year. Funding the CUPE wage increases from within the existing Operating Budget, after already having set the budget for the 2013-14 school year, and knowing that we will need to do so again next year, compounds the challenges we are faced with in order to provide services for students.



In conclusion, the Board would like to reiterate our belief that the Ministry should reconsider mandating the savings plan, and fully fund the wage increase for support staff.

Dear Honourable Fassbender:

On September 10, 2013 the Chilliwack Board of Education wrote to you requesting your permission to set aside S.36(1) of the School Act that requires the holding of a by-election in the event of a trustee resignation. In our letter, we indicated the Board believed it was costly and disruptive to hold a by-election so close to the end of a term. Unfortunately the current legislation prevented you from being able to fulfill our request.

We understand now that the provincial government plans to introduce legislation to change local government elections legislation in the spring of 2014. We would therefore request and urge the Minister to consider including in this legislative change, language allowing the Minister flexibility to approve setting aside a by-election as requested by a Board of Education when a trustee resignation occurs close to the end of a term of office and/or when there are other extenuating circumstances.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit input for the 2014–15 provincial budget.

School District No. 46 encompasses the Sunshine Coast from the communities of Langdale and Gibsons northwest through Roberts Creek, Sechelt and Halfmoon Bay to Pender Harbour and Egmont. In recent years, with the exception of the Annual Facilities Grant cut in 2010, the provincial government has maintained funding to boards at least at previous years' levels regardless of any drops in enrolment. However, because of rising inflationary costs—primarily their reflection in provincially negotiated collective agreements—our board and others have still had to make program cuts over this period in order to balance our budget.

Funding Stability

Therefore, our primary concern in this upcoming year's budget is that although we fully intend to comply with the co-operative gains mandate to fund the 3.5% contractual increase for our support staff, the cuts we must make to realize these savings need to be offset by at least as much funding (approximately \$305,000) added to our 2013–14 funding level in next year's budget. Because the kinds of reductions we tend to make every year will be dedicated to the support staff savings plan this time, any additional cuts will hit the classroom level, which will have a detrimental effect on education in our community. Furthermore, our district faces the additional threat that the Ministry of Education will cease funding us for the benefits standardization costs we had to take on for the 2011–13 BCTF agreement. This provincially negotiated agreement raised the costs of teacher benefits in our school district substantially. We are appreciative that the Ministry was able to fund the difference for the term of the agreement with policy money, but we require that this funding be extended to avoid our district being stuck with a disproportionately dire financial situation, due to a provincially negotiated "net-zero" agreement, in relation to other regions in the province.

Trades and Apprenticeships

We understand that both the Ministers of Education and Jobs, Tourism and Skills Training have been tasked with the BC Jobs Plan goal of offering more apprenticeships and skills training through school districts. We happen to share this goal, as one of the main objectives of our Strategic Plan. We have successful carpentry/framing and culinary arts ACE-IT programs but we've found that in such a tight funding environment we cannot afford to run a deficit while getting new programs off the ground. Our attempts to initiate auto tech and welding programs failed for this reason. Furthermore, in a region of the

province that has no post-secondary trades training/apprenticeships opportunities, we are keen to offer such programs to adults, as well, but again we'll require some up-front funds in order to financially justify the initial promotion and administration of our programs to adult students.

Just as start-up funds for early childhood education were a brilliant investment by our provincial government over the past decade, funds associated with the BC Jobs Plan to build up apprenticeships and skills training programs in school districts should be a centrepiece of this government's legacy. We recognize that job creation and skills training are key components of your mandate supported by the voters of BC. Our school district is eager to help you fulfill this mandate, for the tremendous benefit of our students, our communities and our province's future.

Investment in "Non-Enrolling" Teachers/Special Needs

Due to the enrolment decline and funding levels the past dozen years, districts across the province have had to cut "non-enrolling" teachers such as special education teachers, fine arts/music teachers and librarians. These positions are absolutely necessary to support the educational transformation envisioned by all the most popular current educational thinkers and analysts from John Abbott to Ken Robinson to Paul Tough, and advocated by your government. Robinson argues that the current international labour market, and indeed the future of our province, most desperately needs creativity—which does not tend to emerge from regimented, curriculum-based learning. Tough's research shows curiosity, perseverance and character are necessary to succeed in today's society.

In special education more generally, the most severe structural deficit in the K–12 funding formula is the targeted funding we receive compared to the costs of sufficiently supporting these students. The Learning Improvement Fund has been a help, but doesn't cover the shortfall. It is important to recognize that while enrolment have been declining provincially, the proportion of special needs, and vulnerable students, has been rising everywhere, including on the Sunshine Coast (confirmed by provincial audits and UBC's Early Development Indicator). We also recognize and support the Ministry of Education's study of self-regulation as an effective intervention for special needs students, but this approach should be adopted as a universal classroom practice rather than a panacea for special needs. To even consider the removal of targeted funds for testing, identifying and addressing the special, individual challenges of a growing proportion of children in our province would constitute a huge step backwards for BC socially and societally.

In challenging economic times, our province needs intelligent and visionary government investment in order to fuel an economic comeback and to reap rewards in the future. The most effective tool to provide our province with this prosperous outcome is the education of our children.

RE: Funding for Support Staff Collective Agreement Increases

Our Board has received your letter dated August 26, 2013 providing information about the savings plans needed to support this round of collective bargaining within the K-12 education sector.

The Greater Victoria Board of Education continually strives to maximize programs and services for students. Our district has had to develop an annual savings plan just to maintain service levels. The basic principle of our budget process parallels the principles of the cooperative gains mandate and these measures have already been used to achieve previous budget reductions. Over the past ten years, this Board has closed schools, reduced staffing, cut discretionary budgets, participated in shared services initiatives and worked to develop additional sources of revenue. While we believe that our employees are due a fair wage increase, your request that we find additional savings to pay the wage increase presents us with a significant challenge.

Our district is carrying a structural deficit estimated to be \$9.8 million for the 2014/2015 school year due to the impact of declining enrolment and the fact that funding increases provided by the Ministry have not kept pace with cost pressures. Add to this the on-going cost of the support staff compensation increase of \$1.2 million, the structural deficit increases to \$11.0 million. A key strategy for our board in minimizing the budget and service reductions required to balance the 2014/2015 budget will be to apply any cost savings and additional revenues from the current year to help offset a portion of the funding shortfall, however budget reductions will be required.

While we understand that most of the public sector has concluded collective agreements under the cooperative gains mandate, it is our view that the education sector is unique. School boards throughout the Province have been facing annual provincial funding shortfalls, declining enrolment and additional costs, including for example, the teachers' pension plan rate increase, MSP premium increases, higher B.C. Hydro costs and general inflation, which have led to service level reductions in the K-12 sector. Since the Province has controlled the negotiations, it is essential that the Province provides funding to school districts to cover the costs associated with agreements reached with support staff unions.

Dear Honourable Minister:

Our Board applauded the news of the recent settlement with our CUPE staff. It sees the negotiated increase in wages as fair and deserving. On behalf of our students and their families the Board wishes to express its appreciation to all those involved in reaching this settlement.

At the same time this Board is dismayed that your government refuses to cover the cost of the settlement with additional provincial funding. Your demand that districts pay for the 3.5% increase from savings accrued in the operation of the district, savings that do not exist in most existing district budgets, is unfair and short sighted. As most boards did, we pointed out last year to your predecessor that this school district could not identify any savings without affecting services.

There has been a small change in the Cooperative Gains Mandate to exclude "core" services from the required budget reductions. However, the reductions Boards make now in non-core budgets, to pay for the CUPE increase, will no longer be available in future years to balance the budget when funding protection is removed.

For several years now, this district has explored cost benefits that might be accrued by sharing services with other districts and organizations. We will continue to do so while realizing that our distance to other larger districts limits us. Notwithstanding these efforts, we have no recourse but to reduce in-district services we continue to value in order to fulfill your directive.

Each year for several years, school districts around the province have informed the Ministry that provincial funding had become inadequate to maintain student programs and services. These programs and services provide all pupils the opportunity to develop to their potential and have raised this province's education system to one of the best in the world. Throughout this time, school districts have cut back in order to balance their budgets.

The time has come when further cuts will directly affect students and families. We believe our students deserve the best we can offer them and your government's approach is shortchanging students. We believe it is also detrimental to the standing of this province's excellent education system.

Given your directive, this Board instructed senior staff to identify areas from which we will realize the needed funds to pay for the settlement you negotiated. This decision was distasteful to Board members, who knew that the end result will affect students, families and staff.

One of the "non-core" areas in the Board's Savings Plan will be custodial time, and this will be significantly reduced at most schools. To compensate for this loss of time, carpets in these schools will be vacuumed only every second day from now on. Surely, the effect on the health of young children in these classrooms, the appearance and cleanliness of the schools, the confidence and support of the students' families as well as the shortened length of time these carpets will last is obvious.

In closing we respectfully implore you, as standard bearer of our education system, to rethink asking Boards of Education to make further cuts to services that cannot be but detrimental to providing the programs and environments which will help students develop their full potential.

C. PRESENTATIONS/DELEGATIONS

1. The Lougheed Area Girl Guides of Canada – Guides du Canada

Darlene Kent, Lougheed Area Commissioner, presented information on the vision, mission, values, promise and law of the Girl Guides of Canada – Guides du Canada. Ms. Kent explained that the Girl Guides in the Maple Ridge/Pitt Meadows area are organized into four Units consisting of Alouette, Laity, Port Hammond and Pitt Meadows. Ms. Kent described the impact the rental rate increases have had on the local guiding community with higher registration costs and the decision by some groups to find alternative space. BACKGROUND/RATIONALE:

On October 7, 2013, the enrolment count as at September 30, 2013 was submitted to the Ministry of Education. The following table summarizes the full time equivalent student enrolment variances from projections.

Based in the Ministry of Education Operating Grants manual the above noted enrolment change is estimated to result in additional funding of approximately \$0.8 million. The actual amount will be known in December when the Ministry announces the interim operating grants for school districts. The budget impact of these changes will be reflected in the amended budget.

At this time, given the reported enrolment increase for students with special needs it is recommended that an additional 100 SEA hours per week be allocated for an estimated annual cost of \$0.15 million.
